

Thelma Obiakor is a Research Fellow at CSEA. She also works as an evaluator in the fields of Economics, Education, and Finance, with a critical lens on inclusive development. Her work is situated in the nexus between research, evaluation, policy and practice. She supports international donor organisations and government agencies in gathering evidence and collecting data to inform decision making and conducts rigorous results-based evaluations to measure the impact of their work. She also offers training in Results-Based Management (RBM), including Monitoring and Evaluation, and has developed and deployed several online and offline RBM systems for NGOs in Africa.

Adriano Alfredo Nuvunga



Prof. Adriano Alfredo Nuvunga is the Director of the *Centro para Democracia e Desenvolvimento* (CDD), a Democracy, Governance and Human Rights Organization in Mozambique. He is the Chair of the Forum de Monitoria do Orçamento (FMO), a platform of coalitions and organizations focusing on Budget and Public Finance Management. Prof. Nuvunga Chairs the newly established Mozambique Network of Human Rights Defenders. He is also a member of the Board of the Southern Africa Human Rights Defenders Network (SAHRDN). Prof. Nuvunga is a member of the Board of the *Africa Centre for Energy Policy* (ACEP), based in Accra, Ghana. Prof. Nuvunga is also a member of INCLUDE, the Knowledge Platform on Inclusive Development Policies of the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Prof. Nuvunga teaches political science and governance at the Department of Political Science and Public Administration of the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences of the Eduardo Mondlane University in Maputo, Mozambique. His next book examines the Political Economy of Mozambique's Gas Development and Nation Building.

Akosua K. Darkwah



Akosua K. Darkwah is Associate Professor of Sociology and current head of Department of Sociology at the University of Ghana where she has taught for the last two decades. She holds a PhD in Sociology from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Her research focuses primarily on the ways in which global economic policies and practices reconfigure women's work in the Ghanaian context. To this end, she has explored the impact of structural adjustment policies on traders of global consumer items, the African Growth and Opportunities Act (AGOA) and its effect on factory workers, ILO Convention 181 on private employment agencies and its implications for domestic workers, the ramifications of the global financial crisis of 2008 and its attendant land grabs on peasant farmers and most recently, the impacts of gendered electoral financing on women's political participation. A second line of research she has undertaken, as part of the Migrating out of Poverty Research Consortium funded by the Department for International Development, explored the gendered ways in which households are reconfigured as a result of migration.

Stijn Janssen



Stijn Janssen is senior advisor to the Director General International Cooperation and deputy head of the Bureau for International Cooperation at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Stijn is a member of the internal network of facilitators within the Ministry and facilitates meetings and teamsessions on a regular basis. She spent over 6 years in Kenya working for the European Union and Netherlands Embassy on UN, political and development issues. Prior to that, she held several other positions in the Ministry, where she started her career in 2006.

His research interests include: Rural Development, livelihoods, land, agriculture, food security, migration, social protection, value chain, rural and urban development, local economic development, private sector, local governance, decentralization and NGOs development.

Dirk-Jan Koch

Amref Health Africa, founded in 1957, is the largest Africa-led international organization, reaching more than 11 million people each year through 150 health-focused projects across 35 countries. Until his appointment to Amref Health Africa, Dr Gitahi was the Vice President and Regional Director for Africa, Smile Train International. Prior to that, Dr Gitahi was Managing Director for Monitor Publications in Uganda as well as General Manager for Marketing and Circulation in East Africa for the Nation Media Group. He held progressively senior positions at GlaxoSmithKline and worked at the Avenue Group. Dr Gitahi is former co-Chair of the UHC2030 Steering Committee, a global World Bank and World Health Organization (WHO) initiative for Universal Health Coverage (UHC). He serves on a number of Boards, notably - Board of Directors of The Standard Group in Kenya, Board of Trustees of Safaricom Foundation and Governing Board of the Africa Centres for Disease Control and prevention (Africa CDC). Dr Gitahi holds a bachelor's degree in Medicine from the University of Nairobi, a master's degree in Business Administration from the United States International University; as well as a Certificate for Strategic Perspectives for Nonprofit Management from Harvard University. In December 2018, Dr. Gitahi was bestowed the 2018 'Moran of the Order of the Burning Spear' (MBS) by the President of Kenya, in recognition of his outstanding contribution and commitment to the health sector.
